

Elko High School Academy Students Define "Goals"



The CIS Academy classes at EHS worked on a unit about goal setting. Students learned the definition of goals, the four parts of a goal, writing goal objectives, and finally created their own goal bookmarks. They began the unit by splitting the classes into groups. Depending on the size of the class, the groups were each responsible for making a poster. The students enjoyed using their creativity to decorate and create the goal posters. Once the posters were complete each one was analyzed and discussed. The first poster listed the different definitions of a goal. The class discussed whether one definition was better than the other or if it was possible to describe or define the word "goal" without using the components from each definition. The second poster broke down goal setting into four parts: An Action, A Result, A Time Frame and A Cost. Each element was discussed and examples were given. The third poster was about Goal Objectives. The class discussed the importance of creating an action plan which would serve as a short-term goal in order to reach long-term goals. Finally, they brought everything they discussed and learned together and each student created their own goal bookmarks. They created bookmarks

about one of their personal goals using the four elements listed on the poster and wrote the goal on one side of the bookmark. Students then wrote objectives to meet their goal on the other side of their bookmark. Overall, the unit was a huge success and the Academy students were able to gain an in-depth understanding of goal-setting.

Spring Creek High School Seniors Plan for the Future

Seniors at Spring Creek High School participated in the College and Career Fair at Great Basin College in November. This was a great opportunity for students to speak with different organizations about their options after high school. Many different colleges were available to provide information to students on enrollment requirements and deadlines. There were also many employment opportunities for students to inquire about, including some options for starting up their own business. Additionally, various branches of the military were present to provide information to those interested in pursing that career path. Students came back with a better understanding of options to look forward to after high school.



SCHS Freshman Academy Learns about Conservation

The Freshman CIS Academy classes received a visit from Norv Dallin, Conservation Educator with Nevada Department of Wildlife. Mr. Dallin reviewed the different departments at NDOW and the need of a college degree for most of their jobs. The students also had an opportunity to participate in a volunteer project, where Mr. Dallin demonstrated how to pick sagebrush seed. The sagebrush seed the students gathered will be sent to Reno where it will be dried and sifted to remove any flower parts. It will then be combined with other seed types and loaded in a 6' by 6' hopper and taken up by helicopter. The pilot will operate a motor in the hopper to spray the seed out onto snow in areas that have previously burned. When the snow melts the seed will soak into the soil versus blowing away if dropped onto dry ground. Gathering sagebrush seed gave the students a



great sense of pride to be able to give back to their community and surrounding area. Thanks CIS Freshman Academy for your time!
